Serving is how God transformed my life.

Growing up, I thought my sole purpose in life was to be society's idea of a success: go to university, start a career, start a family – that was the plan. Dropping out of university is what happened instead. The plan failed. The very first step to success fell apart and I fell apart with it.

I'd been in church all my life, but no one had told me that my purpose could be about something more than achieving these milestones. I didn't know that my purpose could be connected to

I remember walking up to the church during that time, with all the unknowns and the

disappointment evidenced by how hard it was to keep from bursting into tears. I paused as I put my hand on the door: I did not feel like serving; I didn't even think I had anything to offer, but I was determined to take a step of faith. I surrendered the weight I was feeling and pushed open the door to serve.

Something about that weekly practice of trusting God with my own needs in order to serve others helped me to trust him all the other days of the week too. I dug into his word and engaged in community. I didn't have a new plan yet, but I did have a direction and I'd certainly found purpose.

I help people identify steps of faith and encourage them to take them.

Celebrate a preschooler's natural ability to include others.

Encourage a 6-year-old to use her voice in prayer.

Empower a teenager to step out of his comfort zone.

Partner with a dad to inspire a whole room full of kids.

Help someone discover and grow their own gifts.

I make space for those who, like me, need a safe place to be reminded of God's faithfulness, purpose, and love. These are the things we get to do on the Kids' Park team. Together as a team, we have all sorts of different perspectives and personalities and gifts. We inspire each other and demonstrate grace with each other. Whether it's a great day or a rough day, we show up trusting God to work through our time, presence, and abilities to love on our kids.

And the kids! The kids will ask you questions that leave you stronger in your relationship with God. They will laugh, sing, play, and dance with you. You might join the team to serve them, but I think you'll find that witnessing and encouraging their child-like faith will help to restore and build up your own.

Students are out and about, ready to try new things, stretching their new-found freedom by exploring all that a university campus has to offer.

Chantal and I, along with many other students and campus staff already involved in Power to Change, are reaching out to these excited students to invite them to explore what life with Jesus could look like. We are surveying students to gauge their interest in spiritual conversations or being involved with a Christian community on campus. We are putting up posters and setting up tables during clubs week to capitalize on the students' willingness to try something new and get involved in something

beyond their studies. University work definitely kicks off strong in September!

This first month of the Fall semester is a crucial time to invite students, as it is when they are most likely to get connected. On campuses across Canada, from Vancouver to Halifax, students are invited to join a community that is invested in helping students answer some of life's big questions like: "Who am I?" "Where do I belong?" "Do I matter?" Power to Change – Students (P2C) firmly believes the answers to these questions find their source in the person and work of Jesus Christ.

Students are lonelier than ever and increasingly finding themselves without a foundation in life. Through Bible studies, prayer, outreach, mentorship, and social events, P2C seeks to equip students to know who they are in Jesus Christ. We strive for each student to experience the belonging that is found in being part of the family of Jesus, and to fully know they have been called to a purpose in Him.



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One way we ride the momentum of September's energy, excitement, and

willingness to explore is to invite students to attend Summit, our annual Fall Retreat, where P2C groups across four major universities in Alberta and Saskatchewan come together for a weekend away to grow in their faith and in community. This event is a great time of bonding and friendship, as well as a place where many catch for the first time P2C's vision for being on mission together across our respective campuses.

Almost a decade ago, Summit greatly impacted both of our lives. It was where I (Ben) first felt called to pursue ministry and to study theology, and where Chantal first decided to participate in a P2C missions trip. Today, we are part of the team working hard to make this event a success.



HOW CAN WE AT OAK PARK HELP?

One of the barriers which often keeps students from coming to Summit is the cost. We subsidize as much as possible for first-year students, and try to incentivize upper-years with sponsorships to keep them coming every year.

Helping Hands offers free food and household items to those in need every Thursday morning at the church. What sets this program apart is its commitment to fostering a sense of community that goes beyond the immediate needs of people. The following was written by one of our regular guests at the program.

"When my kids and I went through an unexpected and sudden turn of events, the impact left us totally broken. What I primarily lost was the strength to just hang on to my very basic breath of life itself, because fear crippled me to the core. I had no ability to pick up the pieces. I saw a premonition of threat everywhere, even in the officials who relieved us from our deadly situation; my whole physical being was in a state of constant

alarm. At that moment, I couldn't even identify what the kids and I needed to survive – how to even face the next day.

I heard about the Helping Hands program through a friend. This program does a very sensitive, ER type of service for the community. We came and were offered clothes with no questions asked and with no judgments made. The way the

volunteers communicated with us and identified what our survival needs were was phenomenal. They helped us get emergency food, bedding and hygiene products. This first step brought us light and strength to figure out the next step. I was very distrustful to grab on to the light, but the volunteers helped me put one foot in front of the other with an assurance that I am not left alone to walk in the dark – they have walked with my kids and I by taking the time to listen to us, and to support us with tenderness. I have received smiles, words of gentleness, and guidance to develop a structure to keep the kids safe and teach them to trust. We have received surprises of household items which I never imagined we would have. The Helping Hands team woke up our self-esteem and have helped it to grow and have made my kids aware of the value of life. The steady rhythm of service offered week after week changed something inside of me and my family. There is a harmony that's been wonderfully coordinated within my thoughts, emotions, words and actions.

Please cheer for all the volunteers of *Helping Hands* with high magnitude – they selflessly serve in tangible and intangible ways which I still can't fathom. I need an infinite number of words to express my gratitude for this program. I'm still on the mend, but at least I know that we are not totally plunged in the dark, and I don't have to close my eyes and be afraid of the light."



GROWTH GROUPS.

"I'd really like to skip Growth Group tonight." This thought often comes to mind around 5:00pm on Fridays as my family gets ready for our weekly Growth Group.

> But every week, as we head home afterward, I tell my wife, "That was great; I love our group." What changes my mind? The answer is simple: the people. Whether we're discussing the scriptures or sharing personal challenges, it's the interaction with the group members that I value the most. The people in my group are a blessing.

> I've been part of various church groups in the past - some were wonderful, others were

not. But I've come to understand that my experiences, whether positive or negative, often reflect my own heart

more than the people in the group. In Genesis 2:18, God says, "It is not good for the humans to be alone." Loneliness was the first problem in God's perfect world. Today, just as in the Genesis story, our hearts

naturally lean towards isolation. We often choose solitude over community because, if we're honest, it feels easier. It is this inclination towards isolation and disconnecting from others that makes 5:00pm on Fridays challenging for me. It's simpler to stay home and watch a show than to engage in conversations about other people's days and faith. However, being part of a Growth Group, especially over the past year, has shown me how much my faith is shaped through community. This growth isn't dramatic or obvious, but it happens in the simple, ordinary practice of meeting together. Each week, our group starts by catching up over snacks before spending time discussing the upcoming Sunday's scripture and then praying for each other and our community. This regular routine encourages me to think about God and others in practical ways. To grow in my relationship with Jesus, I need to grow in my relationships with others - they go hand in hand.

Being in a group is undoubtedly challenging. Growth Groups require commitment, vulnerability, and an openness

to discovering God in new and powerful ways. You might not become best friends with everyone in your group, but the main goal is to deepen your relationship with Jesus. And what better way to do that than by building relationships with others?
